

Mine layout plan on aerial




Blackhill Road Under Mining Update

- Cracking typically 50 80mm

- Next impact on Blackhill road will be early January 2014 from Panel 24 30 January 2014

Pambalong Nature Reserve Support Program Project Report June 2013





Conservation Volunteers is a not-for-profit, community based conservation organisation which was established in 1982 and is recognised as Australia and New Zealand's leading practical conservation group. We manage community involvement in approximately 2,000 conservation projects and 100,000 volunteer days across Australia and New Zealand each year.

Our Vision

We believe in a healthy and sustainable environment, and for everyone to be involved in managing and protecting that environment. Our Mission

To attract and manage volunteers to participate in projects that protect or enhance our environment and heritage.

Background

Pambalong Nature Reserve is a freshwater wetland at the western edge of Hexham Swamp and The Hunter Wetlands National Park and is an integral part of a chain of wetland reserves that includes the internationally significant Ramsar-listed Hunter Estuary Wetlands.

Pambalong Nature Reserve is home to 22 significant bird species, 1 species of migratory shorebirds which is protected by international treaties, 5 threatened species and 2 State listed Endangered Ecological Communities.

In October 2012, Donaldson Coal Conservation Trust forged a partnership with Conservation Volunteers, to provide support to the NPWS managed Pambalong Nature Reserve to improve the health of the wetland(s).

The current Plan of Management for Pambalong Nature Reserve has identified the management of weeds species such as Water Hyacinth and Alligator Weed as a high priority in protecting conservation values in the reserve.

The Pambalong Nature Reserve Support Program aims to support the delivery of the NPWS Plan of Management in its efforts to reduce invasive weed species, and revegetate cleared and degraded areas in order to protect and extend suitable habitat for waders and waterbirds.

Project Objectives

To address environmental issues which require an immediate injection of support through managed teams of volunteers and skilled staff including the Conservation Volunteers Indigenous Land Management Team and engage the local community in a wetland program.







Project Outcomes

The focus, thus far, has been on the South and Central Wetlands, with the professional team undertaking primary and secondary weed control to assist in the eradication of Water Hyacinth (and smaller amounts of Alligator Weed).

The Central Wetland has both Alligator Weed and Water Hyacinth; the team utilised both high pressure hose and backpack spray works, depending on the situation, to control both these weeds and have achieved significant reductions.

The Southern Wetland has only a Water Hyacinth issue and complementary work is also being carried out on this weed upstream.

The team has undertaken predominately spray work due to the large extent of the weed mass but have also completed some manual removal in the more sensitive parts of the wetland.

By the end of the current project the team had moved onto manual removal and have swept the wetland clean of mature Water Hyacinth. The project has shown significant biodiversity outcomes for the wetland and improved habitat for water birds.

The local community were engaged through a multi-agency Pambalong Nature Reserve Community Field Day on Sunday 5th May 2013. The field day was lauded a success with 54 people in attendance who planted 630 trees, constructed 'wallaby guards' of chicken mesh and took part in informative tours of Pamablong and adjoining properties. Tour participants heard from experts and saw the impacts of Water Hyacinth and most importantly how they, as good neighbours, may assist through works on their properties and the resources available.

Statistics:

Since October 2012 the project has delivered significant on-ground outcomes and community engagement:

- Primary and secondary weed control over a 20ha area, comprising both South and Central Wetlands, the Swamp Forest and channels in between the two main water bodies
- 1440 Trees have been planted
- 74 staff days and 136 volunteer days contribution to the project
- Aboriginal Employment outcomes
- Local School Student engagement- Minmi School Tree Planting Day
- The inaugural Pambalong Community Field Day with 54 participants, 2 Government Agencies and 3 community organisations

Future Focus:

It is crucial to build on the outcomes achieved thus far to ensure that gains made, are not lost; on this most noxious weed, which if left unchecked will rapidly re-infest.

Water hyacinth has a seed viability of up to 30 years and Alligator weed needs to be treated a number of times to be effective. Ongoing maintenance activities and additional spray work need to be scheduled in 2013 utilising the professional and community volunteer teams who could undertake important hand removal of the weeds.

Jesmond Lions Club have committed their support to the project also and an additional tree planting day will be scheduled.

The project should be expanded to include North Wetland whilst monitoring and maintaining the work completed on South and Main Wetland, to restore this important ecosystem to a healthy state.

Photographs below indicate the need for an ongoing works program due to the impact of climatic conditions on this dynamic environment .
